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University of Colorado College of Nursing's Center for Midwifery is Designated as an American Academy of Nursing Edge Runner

AURORA, Colo. (August 30, 2022) – The University of Colorado College of Nursing at Anschutz Medical Campus is pleased to announce that its Center for Midwifery has been designated as an Edge Runner by the American Academy of Nursing.

Edge Runners are nurse-designed, innovative models of care or interventions with significant, demonstrated outcomes to improve health, impact cost and influence policy. Each of these programs highlights nurses' ingenuity and collaboration in developing new methods to provide care and promote health equity.

"It's an incredible honor that the Center for Midwifery was named an Edge Runner by the Academy," said CU College of Nursing Associate Professor and Director of Midwifery Services Jessica Anderson, DNP, CNM, WHNP, FACNM. "Since its inception in 2004, the Center for Midwifery has developed an approach that enhances patient satisfaction by providing high-quality, evidence-based healthcare that supports access, options, and shared decision making. This exemplary nurse-led practice is regarded as one of the nation's top midwifery faculty practice and education centers and we're thrilled that the Academy recognizes this work."

The center incorporates holistic care and expert midwifery skills with the goal of providing a safe and satisfying experience that empowers patients. As part of its core philosophy, the practice encourages every pregnant patient to complete a "birth wishes" list that outlines what they envision for their labor and experience. The center also offers a variety of labor-support options such as hydrotherapy, water birth, aromatherapy, nitrous oxide and transcutaneous electrical nerve stimulation (TENS) unit application.

"We're delighted that the Center for Midwifery has been chosen as an Edge Runner by the Academy," said CU College of Nursing Dean and Professor Elias Provencio-Vasquez, PhD, RN, FAAN, FAANP. "Throughout the years, the center has contributed to outstanding outcomes in all of the systems and hospitals affiliated with its innovative model."

Dean Provencio-Vasquez noted that the center's model has a favorable history of cesarean birth (11 to 13% compared to over 30% nationally) and episiotomy rates (less than 1%). He lauded the center's team of Certified Nurse-Midwives for their nationally recognized work in producing such an innovative model of care.

The model is part of an academic midwifery enterprise that started in 1977 to support the subsequent midwifery education program at CU College of Nursing. The enterprise now supports 39 nurse-midwives, four practices, two hospital systems, three hospitals, multiple ambulatory sites, and programs including group prenatal care, family medicine fellowship, student run clinic, a student-run obstetric department and community practice agreements.

"The Academy is proud to designate these unique and timely programs as Edge Runners. The diverse focus of these models highlights the wide range of services, vital support, and teambased approaches that the nursing profession provides," said Academy President Kenneth White, PhD, AGACNP, ACHPN, FACHE, FAAN. "In particular, these models highlight nurses as leaders in innovation for improving care and equity in our health systems."
