

University of Colorado College of Nursing Traditional Pathway Program Prerequisite Guide

- *All courses are required for applicants who have not earned a first bachelor's degree prior to the start of the program. Academic Elective credits are typically needed for students to reach 60 semester (or 90 quarter) transferable units.
- *Applicants who have a first bachelor's degree earned just need to complete the top five prerequisites.
- *Minimum grade of C required to fulfill requirements (grades of C- and below are not applicable).
- *The expiration timeline for prerequisites is 10 years (based on application opening date).

^{*}For students who do not have a previous bachelor's degree, one of these science lectures must have an accompanying lab. Courses that meet the Additional Science Lecture requirement include General Biology, Cell Biology, Genetics, Pathophysiology, Organic Chemistry, Biochemistry or Physics.

^{**}Two courses required, selected from two different content areas (for example, a student could take one History and one Foreign Language course, but not two History courses). American Sign Language is recognized as a Foreign Language.

^{***}Examples of Multicultural Studies classes include Race, Ethnic, Gender or Women's Studies.
